



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Jaguar XKs "Featured Marque" at Hilton Head Island Concours d'Elegance

Our trip to Hilton Head Island in South Carolina for their 2019 Concours d'Elegance was a bit different from our last time there in 2016. This year we were accompanied by our good friends, Tom and Liza Wright. Earlier this year Tom had advised me that the Hilton Head Concours committee was planning to feature XK Jaguars and that we had both been invited! We submitted the necessary paperwork and pictures then arranged for Alfredo, the gentleman who usually transports my two cars, to transport both Wrights' and our Jaguars to Hilton Head Island (HHI). Our schedule required that Alfredo pick up the cars in the morning, deliver them on Halloween night, then stay and not return home until Sunday, November 3rd.

On the evening of October 31, we met most of the other Jaguar exhibitors for dinner at the Red Fish Restaurant. Dinner was arranged by Mr. Bill Schmitt, HHI Concours co-chairman, as well as other concours participants from the local area. RM Sotheby's, Mr. Ramsey Potts was Master of Ceremonies. [If

you've met Ramsey, you'll know he did not need a microphone]. This was a great evening for meeting fellow Jaguar owners and enthusiasts.

On Friday morning, we took our cars out of the trailer and proceeded to join many other exhibitors with all sorts of vehicle brands on the *Tour d'Elegance*. When we arrived on Thursday, the temperature at HHI was in the mid-seventies. By Friday morning it had dropped to the low to mid-forties. Any thought of wearing shorts or putting the car hood down on the convertible during the *Tour* went out the window. Jackets and heaters seemed much more appropriate under a clear and beautiful sky.

The *Tour d'Elegance* took us through the city of Bluffton, South Carolina and its historical center. The Bluffton police department gave all of us in the Tour a motorcycle escort to ensure that our rather large group would remain together. Other vehicles would not be allowed to interfere.

We travelled from Dubois Park where the historic Heyward House is one of the few homes to survive the Civil War. Until recently, the house had been owned by descendants of the Heyward family who had continuously lived there since before the Civil War.

The *Tou*r ended up at the Montague Palmetto Bluff where a number of vehicles from the Historic Vehicle Association were displayed. This was the first time that vehicles from the Historical Vehicle Registry had been displayed as a collection.

On Saturday, HHI held the *Cars Club Showcase*. Genie and I attended and took our transport driver, Alfredo, for a short trip as he was certainly getting bored. I was surprised to find out that HHI awarded prizes in a manner similar to their Concours d'Elegance. In fact, some of the cars displayed at the *Cars Club Showcase* would appear again at Sunday's Concours.

Sunday was again a cold morning but a very pretty blue-sky day. We were directed to park in the "Honored Marque" area reserved for 17 "by invitation" XK Jaguars. A spectacular red 1953 C-Type Jaguar highlighted the Marque, then there was an early XK120 with an aluminum alloy body. Several regular steel bodied XK120s XK140s, XK150s, plus five XK150 'S' models --including our Open Two Seater (OTS) and Tom and Liza Wright's Fixed Head Coupe (FHC) were displayed.

Our Cotswold Blue OTS was judged against only one other 'S', a beautiful dark blue with a black hood, owned by Roy and Linda Cleveland. I noticed the hood [convertible top] was quite beautiful and perfect (like mine). I asked Roy (a very nice man), where he had the top done and I understood him to say Muncie Imports or OSJI --the same trim shop that restored ours. In the end, the judges decided that there can only be one winner, and Roy and Linda were awarded top honors. Genie and I were quite honored to earn second place.

The lead judge in our class later told Genie that both cars were "perfect," but they based their decision with belief that the other OTS' engine ran smoother. When they asked me to start the car, the engine was cold, and the electric choke kicked in as it is supposed to. That makes the engine run at a higher RPM until it warms up (usually just a couple of minutes). The lesson I learned from this experience is to make sure to warm up the engine before the judges arrive next time.

I should note that this year's HHI Motoring Festival was celebrating women's pioneering automotive accomplishments. In an article by Bill Schmitt, he points to their charity, *Driving Young America*, for awarding funds and scholarships. We had a group of young girls go through a full operational check of each car. The idea was to train these young Girl Scouts to pursue careers in automotive related fields. These checks were performed before the actual judges arrived and were simply for training. Of interest: *No Engine Checks*!

Genie and I were pleased to see several JCOF friends at HHI. JAGWire editor, Robert Delmar was there with his camera, of course, and he posted many FUN PHOTOS on the 'net from this and recent years at HHI.



Jaguar XJ 220 X 2 By Ian Crawford

Part 2 of 2



Editor's Note:

In case you haven't noticed, many of our members' memories are not as 'quick' as they used to be. Whether you are among that group or not, you might want to re-read Part 1 of Ian Crawfords excellent story on pages 13-15 of the <u>September-October edition of JAGWire</u>.

lan's story continues:

The motorized headlight covers of an XJ220 are unique, but a little complex. There is a plastic disc that is easy to replace. Often, though, you will see cars with covers misadjusted and the bushing stop may need to be replaced. Many parts may be directly sourced from Bosch etc. I discovered that the headlight control module was forced from a '90 –'92 Firebird/Trans Am/Fiero. Maybe a little bit of American Muscle Car DNA was included.



The panel knobs are from a Ford F150 and the taillights are from Rover. Nothing to be ashamed of however, as the McLaren F1 rear lights came from a Dutch BOVA coach.

Oil changes for an XJ220 are simplified by using a suction pump on the dry sump oil container, as is used in boats. For a full oil change, the underside panel must be removed with many, many, many screws.

The air filters are the oil coated types, similar to K&N. Electronics and fuel injectors are Bosch. Handbook says to change them every two years. An engine-out restoration -including a fuel bladder, hoses and belts-- could be pushed to maybe 10 - 15 years for a well-cared-for, low-mileage vehicle.

There are some XJ220 mechanics in the USA but, in consideration of current monetary values, a vacation to the UK for an in-depth checkup is recommended at least every 15 years. *Don Law Racing* would recommend more frequently. I sent both of my 220s over to Don Law in 2016 for service/repair which took over a year due to the XJ220 repair business being good.

There were also a few unexpected issues. The engine-out belt and fluid service is not too expensive, but while the car is in location and the engine out, it makes sense to do other preventative work. For example: Low pressure tank pumps, oil filters, new hoses of all types ...and the costs escalate rapidly.

There was a small amount of glass delamination. Since I wanted the silver car to be perfect, I ended up changing the windshield and the printed sunroof. The parts were in stock but not a perfect fit. So, I received the silver car back with no roof or windshield. *Not Ideal!* Those parts were finally sourced from the original factory. The lesson to be learned was that virtually all the parts are available, but there could be some delays.

Another huge mistake was sending the cars overseas just short of 25 years old. The "No Questions Asked, just import me" box could not be checked. Customs in Savannah got into a protracted paperwork battle with NHTSA in Washington. Both XJ220s sat in a container on a dock in Savannah for many weeks.



After the demurrage charges reached \$10,000 and my broker seemed to be throwing his hands up, I did research on the guy in charge and called him in Washington. They were worried about illegal modifications being done and wanted to repeat the EPA testing, even though the cars were licensed in Florida! After I said I was a JCNA judge and originality was paramount, I found out he was a Ferrari Judge! We chatted. The cars were released the next day to the astonishment of my Broker, who then treated me as some kind of Deity.

As I write, Jim Randle passed away. This is the Engineer who started it all by forming the Saturday Club (design a supercar in your spare time without the Company's knowledge). I am humbled to be a custodian of his legacy, the magnificent XJ220 Supercar.

A Jaguar Love Story

Twas a dark and stormy night - - -.

Nah! Actually, it was a cold and damp winter afternoon when I first fell in love with Jaguars. First was a topless red XK-140 OTC, as I remember. What a glorious demo ride that was. However, begging a ride was one thing, but a Jaguar of my own was still far in the future.

It was on another cold winter's afternoon three years later that I went to check out a rather tired looking 1955 XK-140 MC Fixed-Head-Coupe for sale. Sitting there, it looked positively regal despite its faded pewter paint. By then in college, I could barely afford the princely \$700 asking price. But, as they say, love is blind. I was smitten. Money was quickly passed. The Jaguar was mine --for better or worse. Unfortunately, my blurred vision failed to foresee a plethora of awaiting mechanical issues. Thus, began my "Joys of Jaguar Ownership-Class 101".

Lesson one came all too quickly. The clutch started to slip on the drive home, to the point that I barely made it up the hill. Now, according to the official Jaguar Service Manual, it is possible to change the clutch in an XK-140 from inside the car. True. I found the job could be done that way but, as I soon discovered, it was definitely not the preferred procedure. The better way was to yank the whole power train out of the car, then deal with the clutch. Lesson one was literally learned the hard way!

Ah, but the joys of driving a classically beautiful Jaguar around town were many, especially one fitted with mellow glass-packed mufflers.

Being a coupe, the vagaries of New England weather were taken in stride. Its skinny 600-16 tires even did a fair job in snow. My only real gripe was heater performance, specifically the lack thereof. Why English cars of the era had such weak heaters and defrosters remains a mystery to me to this day.

Lesson two was more generic. A huge problem with cars of the era was body corrosion, a process hastened in the northeast by heavy usages of road salt. Jaguars were no exception. An almost complete lack of rust proofing and less than perfect body work meant that XKs were subject to extensive rusting, especially behind the doors. I soon treated my coupe to extensive body repairs, topped off by a beautiful blue-gray metallic repaint. Sadly, I later learned that all that work had just delayed the inevitable. However, my Jag sure looked gorgeous for a while!

Another lesson painfully learned was the outrageous costs of most imported parts. Authentic Jaguar parts were either expensive or unavailable back in the mid-60's. On a very limited budget, my work-around was to buy a derelict parts car. It actually ran when pulled out of a snowbank, but both rear tires could be seen from the driver's seat! By the time its remains were finally hauled away, the Jag was little more than a rusted-out shell.

One good thing about Jaguar XKs must be mentioned: they were mechanically simple. For example, they had no computers to stare and swear at. One thing I quickly discovered was that a large wrench — I should say "spanner" -- could pack a wallop that would oftentimes awaken a sleeping Lucas electric fuel pump. That trick worked for me numerous times! Thinking back, it is truly amazing the many things an inanimate object was able to teach a young college student.

Here I must emphasize that I did truly love my XK-140. Despite its mechanical and cosmetic issues, more than 30 thousand miles were added to its odometer in the three years I owned it. It never left me completely stranded, in part because I always kept a tow rope in the trunk. Driving it I was king of the hill and its beauty never failed to put a smile on my face. The aforementioned lessons also served me in good stead when I graduated from college and started working in Detroit.


When I arrived there in the fall of '64, the Jaguar E-Type had been on the market for only two years; thus, they were a rare sight. My older XK-140 was even more rare. In fact, I cannot remember ever seeing another on the road. Driving it In the 'Car Capital of the World' often resulted in questions, like: "What is it?" and "What year?"

Unfortunately, by then my Jaguar's body had started to perforate for the second time. Realization sank in that the affliction was terminal. Sadly, I suspected its fate would be much the same as that of my recently departed parts car. With great sadness I put my beloved Jaguar up for sale and went on with my life.

Now, it's 50-something years later and what am I driving? Not surprisingly, it is a 1956 XK-140 FHC! This Jag is an unrestored survivor with a rather colorful past. The car exhibits many flaws of old age but wears them proudly. Incredible to me, it has no significant body rust! Repainted some time ago in Jaguar's primrose yellow, it still looks spectacular --if you don't inspect it too closely. A sorely needed clutch replacement was done by a local repair shop, as I still remember Lesson One!

On the road, my 'new-old' Jaguar runs well and gets lots of accolades, along with many of the same old questions. I like to drive it on warm, sunny days when I am not 2nd place in Driven Class D1/PRE tinkering with it. Keeping up with traffic is no problem, and what wonderful music Sir William Lyon's straight-six engine makes with sport mufflers!

> It has been said that you can't relive your youth. To that I say: "Hogwash!" Its classically beautiful lines still make me smile, and driving it takes me back to the 60's and many fond memories. For me, my Jaguar love story has truly withstood the test of time.



1956 Jaguar XK 140 Coupe

Jaguar stunned the world in October of 1948 with its new XK 120 sports car. Featuring a 160HP, 3442cc. DOHC 6-cylinder engine, the XK 120 boasted a 120+ MPH top speed, making it the fastest production car in the world at that time. XK 120 manufacturing ended in 1954 to make way for its successor, the redesigned Jaguar XK 140.

Improvements incorporated into the new model included higher horsepower engines, rack & pinion steering, an optional overdrive and a more comfortable interior. The XK 140 was offered in three body styles, OTC (roadster), DHC (convertible) and FHC (coupe). The latter differed from the other two models in having a larger cockpit incorporating a vestigial rear seat.

Only 1,965 left hand drive coupes were built during the XK 140's three-year production run.

This vehicle is one of only two 1956 XK 140 FHC's sold in France. It was originally delivered in May of that year to Charles Delacroix, the Jaguar distributor in Paris. A basic model with the spats-delete option and overdrive, the car was fitted with dimmable Stadium driving lights, dual exhausts and wheel 'rimbellishers' before being sold to a local resident, a Mr. S. Lushing.

It is not known when or how this vehicle got to the United States. What has been documented is that it spent more than 10 years in southern California before being driven north to Oregon. In 2004 the car's American owner for more than 40 years passed away. A neighbor subsequently purchased it and drove this Fixed-Head-Coupe regularly until it was sold to its current owner, Art Patstone, in late 2015. The odometer showed 129,000 kilometers (80,100 miles) as of October, 2018.

This 1956 Jaguar is basically in as-delivered condition. The few exceptions include:

- An older repaint in 'Primrose Yellow' (originally 'Old English White')
- · An engine rebuild following an intake valve tappet guide failure
- An aluminum radiator & electric fan to improve engine cooling

Hemmings 'Sports & Exotic Car' magazine has written that "the XK 140 FHC possesses a beauty like few other automobiles" and it is "hard to find a single bad line on this Jag, because there are none to be found". It is truly a timeless design, one that still turns heads wherever it is shown.

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




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
