President's Perspective

But JCNA has made significant strides in this area since then and many individual clubs have found it to be extremely beneficial. Facebook is the most popular platform since it can be made accessible to the public as well as restricted to club members only. It functions in real time to log whatever activities the members of the group choose to post. Most clubs naturally share photos and comments from events as they happen, but they also use it to communicate among members for daily news and casual conversation. By having the Facebook account open to the public anyone can see what the club is doing or talking about on a daily basis. Here's what got my attention: A few clubs that I spoke with that are recently active in Facebook claimed that it was the single most significant factor in attracting new members. Most of these new members were "younger" buyers of modern Jaguars who were looking for new opportunities to drive and enjoy their cars with like-minded friends. This is exactly the demographic that car clubs need to continue to prosper in the 21st century.

The challenge we face is how can we make social media work for us? There are various alternatives like Instagram for posting photos and YouTube which is the standard for videos. Nobody had much to say about Twitter at the AGM. So let's start with Facebook since that seems to be the consensus choice among Jaguar clubs with experience in social media. Clearly we need someone to coordinate our site that is both knowledgeable in the operation of the platform and genuinely interested in making it a success for JCOP. I have mentioned this before and I will repeat it here: That person is not me. If you think you might be interested in assuming this project for the benefit of the club, please give it some serious consideration and discuss your thoughts with someone on the Board. One club has the teenage son of a member managing their Facebook account for a modest monthly salary. What a great way to both have the family involved in the car hobby and engender interest in Jaguars. Could we adopt this approach? We are an equal opportunity organization. Although I am not an active participant in any social media venues I do acknowledge the popularity and effectiveness for conveying information that these sites enjoy. This capability has resulted in demonstrated success for other Jaguar clubs to enhance camaraderie and bolster membership. We need to take a serious look at utilizing these integrated mainstays of modern culture to keep JCOP growing and evolving with the times. Our club depends on your help to make it happen.

<u>DIRECTIONS TO JCOP MAY 22, 2022 PICNIC</u> <u>@ ROOSEVELT SHELTER IN NORTH PARK</u>

Roosevelt Shelter is located on Walter Road in North Park. While there are many ways to get there (one can use MapQuest or some other GPS navigation tool or access the North Park map on the Allegheny County Parks website), some suggested Directions are provided for convenience below but in all instances the Speed Limit in North Park is 25 mph unless marked lower and it is strongly recommended your obey the posted limit:

If you are coming from the North

If you are coming south down Rt. 8, go past the PA Turnpike until you get to Wildwood Road (where there is a BP Gas Station and McDonalds on your left at the intersection). Turn RIGHT onto Wildwood Road. Go west for some miles until you come to North Park where the name of the road changes to E. Ingomar Road right after an Exxon Gas Station on your right. Go straight past the stoplight at Babcock Bouldevard (where the Lake will come into view). Proceed to the next stoplight and turn RIGHT onto Kummer Road. After only a few yards, take the first RIGHT Turn onto Lake Shore Drive. The road splits almost immediately and you will bear LEFT onto Walter Road. Go past the first few buildings and up a hill and when you come to what appears to be an old church on your left, Roosevelt Shelter will appear on your right. Pull into the parking area and park on the side of the lot by Roosevelt Shelter but not right next to it since we will want some open space to get in and out of the lot and for deliveries of food, etc.

If you are coming south down Rt. 19/McKnight Road, stay on McKnight Road where Rt. 19 splits off and you will immediately come to the Pine Creek Shopping Center on your right (where there is a Target Store and Giant Eagle). Go straight past the first light where there is a Walgreen's but get in the left lane and then the left turning lane for the next stoplight across from where there was a PNC Bank branch and there is the Giant Eagle and a KFC franchise. Turn LEFT onto Blazier Drive and follow that until it "T's" out at E. Ingomar Road. Turn LEFT onto E. Ingomar Road. Go until the stoplight at Kummer Road. Turn LEFT onto Kummer Road. After only a few yards, take the first RIGHT Turn onto Lake Shore Drive. The road splits almost immediately and you will bear LEFT onto Walter Road. Go past the first few buildings and up a hill and when you come to what appears to be an old church on your left, Roosevelt Shelter will appear on your right. Pull into the parking area and park on the side of the lot by Roosevelt Shelter but not right next to it since we will want some open space to get in and out of the lot and for deliveries of food, etc.

If you are coming from the South or East, get to either Rt. 8 or Rt19/McKnight Road.

If you are coming North on Rt. 8, go north until you come to Wildwood Road (where there is a BP Gas Station and McDonalds on your right at the intersection). Turn LEFT onto Wildwood Road. Go west for some miles until you come to North Park where the name of the road changes to E. Ingomar Road right after an Exxon Gas Station on your right. Go straight past the stoplight at Babcock Boulevard (where the Lake will come into view). Proceed to the next stoplight and turn RIGHT onto Kummer Road. After only a few yards, take the first RIGHT Turn onto Lake Shore Drive. The road splits almost immediately and you will bear LEFT onto Walter Road. Go past the first few buildings and up a hill and when you come to what appears to be an old church on your left, Roosevelt Shelter will appear on your right. Pull into the parking area and park on the side of the lot by Roosevelt Shelter but not right next to it since we will want some open space to get in and out of the lot and for deliveries of food, etc.

If you are coming North on McKnight Road, go past all the shopping centers and such. When you pass the McCandless Crossings Shopping area, go straight past the stoplight at Cumberland Road. You will then come to one more stoplight and go straight past that and get in the right lane. In about a quarter mile or so, you will see a sign that says to bear right to Hampton Township. Take that ramp to the right and it will being you onto E. Ingomar Road. Go to the second stoplight and that will be at the intersection of Kummer Road. Turn LEFT onto Kummer Road. After only a few yards, take the first RIGHT Turn onto Lake Shore Drive. The road splits almost immediately and you will bear LEFT onto Walter Road. Go past the first few buildings and up a hill and when you come to what appears to be an old church on your left, Roosevelt Shelter will appear on your right. Pull into the parking area and park on the side of the lot by Roosevelt Shelter but not right next to it since we will want some open space to get in and out of the lot and for deliveries of food, etc. If you are coming from the West or any other area not specifically noted above, either check

If you are coming from the West or any other area not specifically noted above, either check a map to see how to get to one of the above locations and then proceed per the directions or call Stu Benson ahead of time and he can tell you how to best get to the picnic location. For example, if one is on I-79 and gets off at the Wexford Exit for Rt. 910, there is an easy way to be in the very right lane of the exit so as to then turn right onto Rt. 910 and immediately take the first RIGHT turn onto Brandt School Road. Follow this road until you turn left onto Pine Creek Road and take that until you get to the Pine Creek Shopping Center where you will turn left at a stop sign and immediately turn right onto McKnight Road. From there, follow the directions above "If you are coming south down Rt. 19/McKnight Road".

JCOP April 30, 2022 Tech Session at FAST Company

On Saturday, April 30, 2022 JCOP enjoyed a super "Tech Session" at Fowler Automotive Street & Track LLC in Glenshaw, PA. A large group of thirty men and women – comprised of members with some sons and friends accompanying them - enjoyed a beautiful day that allowed many of them to drive their Jaguars to the session, followed by many then taking a short but scenic cruise to the Brick & Barrel Cross Keys restaurant on Dorseyville Road near Fox Chapel where everyone had a most enjoyable lunch in an historic structure built as the Cross Keys Hotel in 1850. Certainly, the rescheduling of this event from two weeks earlier turned out to be a most prescient decision since among other issues, the weather on the originally scheduled date of April 16 was perhaps the most lousy weather possible with driving rain, sleet, snow and hail that day!

Dan Fowler treated attendees to donuts and coffee and a super presentation about "things to consider" in maintaining older vehicles. Before the presentation, everyone enjoyed touring the extensive premises where they viewed many most interesting cars being worked on for a range of needs. Due to supply chain issues, many vehicles were awaiting delivery of necessary parts to complete repairs, updates, maintenance, and other needs. These vehicles were most interesting to view, and discuss with others, not to mention the opportunity to ask Dan about various technical matters related to those cars. Dan had Stu Benson's Type 1.5 E -Type up on a lift where he used the car after his formal presentation to show any number of interesting features of the E-Type from standing underneath the vehicle demonstrating the limited "jack points" to properly lift the E-Type without damaging it, the inboard rear disc brake system, and identifying and pointing out any number of "underneath the vehicle" features not otherwise commonly seen by most folks.

Dan's presentation involved talking about many systems in older vehicles; he felt given the time allotted he could not do justice to the newer Jaguars (he, for exam-





ple, owns an E-Pace himself and is a JCOP member) but some of what he discussed is applicable to all vehicles, including:

Dan discussed how DOT date coding is present on all tires. After his oral presentation, he showed where this date coding was on any number of tires on various vehicles in the shop. The coding is only on one side of the tire so if not apparent on the outside, then look on the inside.





It is normally right near the rim of the wheel. The coding says "DOT" followed by numbers representing the last two digits of the year of manufacture followed by two digits representing the week of manufacture. For example, on Stu Benson's E-Type the code (on the inside of the tire) said "1838" meaning it was manufactured in the 38th week of 2018. Dan shared that manufacturers recommend replacing tires after 5 years. There can be variables on this, however, such as if your tires are on vehicles that are not driven a lot and are garaged where there is no ultraviolet rays from the sun, as opposed to being stored outside in the weather. The issue becomes one of "dry rot" and it is not only discernable on the sidewalls but one has to inspect inside the treads. Dan noted he often finds Pirelli tires susceptible to dry rot a bit sooner that some other makes but, of course, this depends on many variables. If owners are driving their cars just occasionally with local drives to car shows, this can also be a variable where one can get away with a bit of longer tread life. If a vehicle is driven at any real speed other than just puttering around, the tire is more important, of course. The takeaway is that it is best to DRIVE YOUR CAR and not let it sit but owners need to really inspect their tires for dry rotting, preferably up on a lift once the date code reaches 5 or 6 years after manufacture. Since Classic-plated cars still need a Pennsylvania State Inspection, this is typically done then but cars with Antique plates do not need annual State Inspections and these need to especially be "inspected" for various matters by a knowledgeable person looking at various systems, starting with date codes on the tires (or should we say "tyres" for our Jaguars?).

Dan talked a lot about Brake Fluid changes being needed every two or three years in most instances but most people not having much knowledge about this. Most Brake Fluid is "hydroscopic" which means it absorbs water which is taken in anywhere through the brake system since the Brake Fluid reservoir is not hermetically sealed, nor are the brake line fittings and brake calipers, either. Humidity means "water in the air" and it makes its way into the brake fluid. Once water is in brake fluid it lessens, not insignificantly, the boiling point of the brake fluid and as the boiling point is reduced, so is the braking system ability. Dan provided specific numbers of DOT 3, 4 and 5 brake fluid both as new and once water hydroscopically gets into the fluid, which can occur with a car just sitting in one's garage.

Water in brake fluid can also cause rust or corrosion in the brake lines and calipers. Dan recommends changing brake fluid at least every 3 years with a flush of the system and new fluid. Just like a flush of the cooling system/radiator with new antifreeze mixture every so many years. The one exception Dan noted to needing new brake fluid every 3 or so years was if one uses DOT 6 Brake Fluid which is silicone and having the ability to do a complete brake system overhaul with new hoses and special tight fitting connections like he pointed out he did on Stu's E-Type that will not need such frequent brake fluid flushing and changing; however, using DOT 6 Brake Fluid comes with a caveat since other brake fluid cannot be mixed with DOT 6 and if DOT 6 gets low then only DOT 6 can be added and it is not always available at other than auto parts suppliers and auto repair shops that deal with vintage vehicles.

A significant discussion ensued with Dan presenting information about fuel systems. On older vehicles designed before gasoline with some ethanol became the normal for unleaded fuel, the use of gasoline with ethanol can rot out gasoline lines and carburetors and fuel injection systems. Dan shared how replacement hoses and other parts need to be utilized that are designed for gasoline with ethanol. Cars designed to use leaded gas can use unleaded gas but Stu Benson shared how he uses Aviation gas to add to his using ethanol free gasoline in his classic cars that are pre-catalytic converter equipped. Dan pointed out that aviation gas (Stu Benson said it is 110 octane low lead) cannot be used with catalytic converters since it will destroy the catalytic converter so one has to investigate each vehicle's equipment; since Stu has some classic cars needing higher octane, he uses a base of ethanol free gasoline (which can be obtained at selected sites but is more expensive than gasoline with ethanol) and mixes in some aviation gas and this provides the anti-knock feature [Octane only is a measure of the gasoline's ability to not detonate prematurely and is only needed in higher compression engines; higher octane provides no more "power" than lower octane] and the little bit of lead mixed in via the Aviation Gas helps with the valve seats in Stu's classic car that have original and not "hardened" valve seats having been installed for unleaded gasoline.









Dan Fowler shared how important it is when storing a car to do a few things. First, have the gas tank filled so condensation does not develop that will rust the inside of the gas tank above the top of the gasoline level as well as the full tank will immerse the gasoline level sending unit and help avoid deterioration of the unit from condensation. Second, he recommends using Stabil Marine (the blue Stabil fluid) when storing a vehicle for more than a month or two. Third, Dan said that just starting one's car and pulling it out in the driveway to get to low idle and then pulling it back into the garage is OK for the starting system but is bad for other systems that need to get up to full operating temperature to get



water out of the exhaust pipe. Dan's strong advise is "Drive the car" even locally until it is up to operating temperature before putting it away. This gets all the fluids up to operating temperature and gets moisture out of the exhaust system. Rick Caufman (who won the "longest drive to the Tech Session" with his wife, Becca, coming from Corry, PA in Erie County) shared that for every gallon of gasoline burned in a vehicle a gallon of water goes into the exhaust system or something close to that formula; check it out on Google) and this confirms Dan's advices to not just idle one's car in the driveway (since water could collect in low spots in the exhaust system) but DRIVE YOUR VEHICLE as much as one can since driving the car on the road will get the exhausted water vapor out of the exhaust system.

Dan also recommends occasionally moving the car back or forward to avoid flat-spotting tires when a vehicle is stored for any period of time. There are, of course, specially manufactured wheel molds with a curve that can be bought and the vehicle can be driven up into them so all four tires are in a "mold" that is rounded where the bottom of the tire comes in contact with the ground. But just moving the car every so many weeks a few feet different can achieve a beneficial effect as well.

Dan also discussed perhaps installing a Petronix electrical ignition unit in place of "points" where it can be mounted below the cover for the old points and no one will really know it is there except you since the performance will be good and having to re-gap or replace points in the Distributor will be avoided.

There were any number of questions for Dan along with other things of great interest and importance he answered and discussed. Some were very technical and some were more generic. The hour and a half formal session went quickly since everyone was immersed with interest.

Jim Dolan, JCOP member/longtime owner of many Jaguars/ Chairman of the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix, was invited to speak about the Kastner Cup which is an annual race of vintage Triumphs held throughout the United States. In 2022 this race is returning to the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix Historics at Pitt Race on Saturday, July 16 @ 1:15 PM. Jim shared that he knows many of the JCOP members have Triumphs or like Triumphs and would be interested in coming to the race, perhaps as a group event. More information will be forthcoming in the June and July Jaguar Jargons. PVGP brochures were available for Tech Session attendees to take home with them.

While everyone has Dan Fowler's Contact Information from the last couple Jaguar Jargon editions and many attendees took his business card home with them, for convenience Fowler Automotive Street & Track, LLC is located with an address of 1201 William Flinn Highway (Route 8) in Glenshaw, PA 15116 but it is recommended you follow the directions (and tips for the last hundred yards coming and leaving) provided in the Jargon articles about the Tech Session or on-line at the FAST Company website. Those coming to the Tech Session said they appreciated the directions greatly. fastcompanyproductions@gmail.com is the email address for Dan Fowler. A future Tech Session will hopefully be scheduled at FAST Company to do the Tech Session originally scheduled two years ago but canceled due to COVID-19 where we will have experts from Meguiar's come and instruct and show us how to clean and detail a vehicle and undertake the kind of so-called "paint corrections" that we can all learn to undertake ourselves. It is a process of learning, equipment, and practice and everyone will come away with a much better appreciation of how show cars look so good and all the time, effort, and sweat that goes into the final presentation. We will shoot for 2023 if not this Fall to undertake this Tech Session once Meguiar's is again doing hands-on presentations given the COVID-19 situation and their company policies in such regards.


