Your Monthly Bill May 2025



Although none of us had to rent tuxedos or be fitted for special evening gowns, the feelings were similar to the lead up to a wedding — eighteen months of extensive planning and preparation and — it's all over in a flash!

One hundred fifty-six people registered for one or more events during the four-day AGM. On Friday, more than eighty people from across North America were treated to the beauty and history of our area as participants in the Covered Bridge Driving Tour and Lunch. Thirteen out of town guests without cars were chauffeured by DVJC volunteer drivers. Many other delegates and guests drove to the AGM and used their own cars. Drivers and navigators in this signature event were treated to a beautiful route book describing the history of the area and the numerous landmarks observed along the drive.

The Simeone Museum was the site of Friday evening's welcome event where one hundred



twenty-four people admired (drooled over) Dr. Simeone's collection of world-famous racing cars. One hundred eleven JCNA members and guests capped off the weekend with cocktails and dinner on Saturday evening. Two special guests were with us that evening. Ben Franklin, inventor, diplomat, printer, statesman, publisher, writer and political philosopher joined us for cocktails and dinner. During dessert, he shared things he has learned over his long, 319-year, lifetime. spoke of the challenges he faced discovering electricity with his

kite. His first attempt failed because he was using Lucas kite string. Once that was replaced,

voila, electricity! He has also kept pace with the evolution of EVs and anxiously awaits introduction of the Type "00."

The keynote speaker was Brandon Baldassari, the Jaguar executive charged with the successful introduction of their new, all-electric vehicles.



He provided an overview of the business drivers behind the "clean break" change to the new lineup, the accompanying rebranding strategy and timeline for commercial introduction of the new car. He told us that the pink and blue coupes are concepts only and that the first model to hit the streets will be a four door GT car. Prototypes are currently undergoing extensive road testing.

Ed Petrow and Tim Duckett represented DVJC as our delegates at the JCNA business meeting on Saturday. The full agenda included election of JCNA officers and regional directors, review and approval of Concours rule changes and many other topics.

Work on this project began during the summer of 2023. Of course, none of this could have happened without the unselfish contributions of volunteers from our club who are listed on page 8. Many of them wore multiple hats for extended periods of time.

Some of the topics discussed during the April meeting of your board of directors included club finances (excellent shape), membership (including actionable items from the recent survey), purchasing club merchandise with the new logo, events and proposed bylaw revisions. Those revisions are primarily housekeeping (consistency of terminology, etc.) and updating the amendment procedure. These changes will be presented to the club for ratification in the near future.

Our event calendar is gearing back up beginning in May. The month kicks off with the golf outing on Friday May 2 and is followed immediately by the final Concours judge training and testing session the next day. This year's

Membership Musings

May 2025

Congratulations and kudos to the DVJC team which planned and executed the JCNA Annual General Meeting! Hosting that series of events last week was arduous and time consuming, however your club certainly rose to the occasion with the help of many volunteers who are recognized elsewhere in this *Purr*. What a terrific reflection on DVJC and its Jaguar enthusiasts! Well done all!



Among the other accolades our club received at the AGM, our own Kevin Fitzgerald was presented with a JCNA award for the "Top Jaguar Journal Submission" for his cover story from the May/June 2024 Jaguar Journal submission entitled "The Evolution of a Racing E-Type". Kevin also presented the "E3A Story" at one of the Saturday afternoon technical sessions. Well-deserved Kevin!

Now that the AGM is in the rearview mirror, it's time to enjoy springtime in the Delaware Valley with all of its positives (dogwood, azalea, warm breezes, the return of driving season) and a few negatives (mostly, pollen so thick that your car has now become the Jaguar shade known as "Primrose"). Of course, from the standpoint of club membership, it's a time to take stock of where we are relative to our historical member census trend now that renewal season is essentially done.

In one sense, we are constrained by our previous success. 2024 was a year of profound DVJC membership growth, in which our numbers swelled from 155 (December 2023) to 180 (December 2024). As of this writing, our cohort of renewing and new members for 2025 is 152. While that is roughly where we were at this point in calendar 2024, and there is plenty of time to regain our previous member level, nevertheless member non-renewal attrition has presented a setback.

Your DVJC Board of Directors has discussed this and appreciates that the quality of the membership experience is as or more important than the quantity of members. For my part, I was reminded of my "job description" when reviewing our bylaws recently in the context of some house-keeping amendments. "The Membership Director shall be responsible for Club development and growth by strengthening relationships with current members and attracting new members through marketing and promotion initiatives including distribution of member information and literature." (DVJC Bylaws, Section 5.1, emphasis added)

Consistent with that, I have been asked to take a first cut at a "Membership Engagement Strategy" proposal for discussion at our July 2025 DVJC Board of Directors meeting. In essence, the objective here is to determine what we can do to see that more of those 152 members participate in more of our events and activities this year. I'm happy to take this on, however I surely won't be able to do it alone, or as well as could be done with your input. While we have some ideas from our recently concluded DVJC member survey, I'm respectfully requesting your collaboration, with nothing being too unusual or outrageous to suggest. With huge caveats that (1) few of us are probably in this classic or modern Jaguar hobby to make a profit and (2) "value" is a much different concept than price, occasionally I like to wander off road in this column to check in on the monetary performance of our automotive investments. One source which I consult frequently is the series of Hagerty indices, which because of the number of transactions in which they are involved as an insurer or seller is a seemingly meaningful data point. In an article from Hagerty's Adam Wilcox published late last week entitled "The Collector Car Market Is Now Flat" the current Hagerty Market Rating was revealed (see graph above). For context, they describe this instrument as one which: ". . . measures the current status of the collector car market in terms of activity or "heat," directional momentum, and the underlying strength of the market. It is expressed as a closed 0-100 number . . . "

Interpreting the chart, Wilcox explained that dropping below a benchmark of 60 indicates a "Flat Market". While the rating had recently dropped to pre-pandemic levels, nevertheless he observed "This is the first time since the fall of 2020 and only the second time in the last 13-and-a-half years that the Market Rating has been in the "flat market" territory."





Hagerty also publishes something called the "Hagerty Market Index" (shown above) which is an open-ended stock-market-style version of the market rating. To the surprise of no one, that also declined last month. Wilcox observed: "In the 28 months following the Hagerty Market Index's high point in late 2022, the Index has only increased twice. While currently at its lowest value in over three years, it is still relatively high compared to the Index's 18-year-long history..."


Well, as they say, "your mileage may vary". I suppose that relative to your currently flagging 401(k), IRA, or other "balanced" investment portfolio which some financial wizard has set you up with, "Flat" doesn't sound so bad, right? Nevertheless, unless you are a potential buyer in the market to "bag a Jag" this looks like a good time to sit tight and enjoy the other elements of value of your motoring assets. DVJC can help you with that of course, through events and activities designed to assure you receive participation dividends on your investments. While not in the business of providing financial advice, I suggest simply: "Get out and drive!"

The Rest of the Story, 1969 XKE FHC, May Calendar Car

As the cold winter winds of 2023 gave way to brief glimpses of spring along with the promise of finding our way to new Jaguar-friendly back roads, we examined our modest collection of Jaguars in our stable. Realizing that with several

Naturally, our solution to this vexing problem was to acquire another Jaguar that was already in roadworthy condition. Since we did not have a series 1 or 2 XKE and of course, always coveted the distinctive look of these iconic cars, our research into the possibility of our using an XKE for vintage road rallies and a variety of events suggested it was indeed a possibility. But would we fit comfortably into one and could we find a suitable example in a short period of time?

Fortunately, there are a number of presentable XKE examples belonging to DVJC members who were kind enough to let us sit in their cars and explain the differences of each series and model year. Series 1 XKEs were first shown to an eager public at an International Auto Show in 1961 and was spotted by Enzo Ferrari. Certainly no stranger to beautiful cars, upon seeing it for the first time he famously remarked that this was the most beautiful car he had ever seen. It remains a stellar example of post war automotive history. But despite inherent beauty and collectability, Series 1 examples lack the interior room and occupant comfort and safety of Series 2 XKEs especially the coupes. Ultimately, we decided a late model Series 2 would be best for us and thus began our search for the right car.

We found this 1969 Jaguar XKE Series 2 Coupe in spectacular Signal Red over Biscuit. This particular E-Type FHC had been



brought back to life over the past twenty years by a progression of Jaguar enthusiast owners each making important improvements to this solid, well documented, high level driver's example of an iconic automobile design. The numbers-

matching car had traveled only about 68k miles and the odometer was believed to be correct. There was extensive documentation



and an immense list of replaced parts included in two three-ring binders of receipts.

The owner had been trying to sell it at the peak of the market for more than 40% over what we were willing to spend. After several lengthy phone calls to the owner, we agreed on a price somewhere in between and struck a deal. The car lived in Texas and we arranged to have it shipped to our home in PA. Arriving exactly on schedule, we saw it for the first in the brilliant sunlight of an August afternoon. It was exactly as reported; resplendent in well-maintained signal red livery the correct color for 1969 XKE although the car had originally been delivered to the US in different colors. With a very long list of recent and previous work completed on the car by previous owners, we began immediately driving it regularly and showed it at several DVJC events. With time and miles, we gained confidence in the car suffering only a few very minor mechanical and electrical issues. Still without a working vintage Jaguar suitable for inclement weather driving, we decided to enter it in the 2023 31st New England 1000 road rally in October hosted by Rich and Jean Taylor. If you have never taken one of Rich and Jean's Vintage Road Rallies, we heartily encourage you to do so while they are still available. We have been on several and each one is different with new hotels and places to see. Here's the link to their website: https:// www.vintagerallies.com/

During the rally, we thoroughly enjoyed the Series 2 creature comforts that included all new upholstery, carpets and ceiling fabric, reclining seat backs and especially the modern retractable

shoulder seat belts. Carol drove it often during the 1300-mile trip beginning at the Audrain Museum and Concours at the Breakers then heading north through the scenic Green Mountains of Vermont and down along the Maine and New



Hampshire coast. With Carol behind the wheel, I had the opportunity to practice my

poor navigational skills from the passenger seat and pay close attention to the mechanical operation of the car. However, as we navigated around to the various first-class lunch stops and hotels along the route, we quickly grew weary of contorting our aging bodies to squeeze into the cramped interior of the Series 2 especially compared to our Series III OTS. As we drove more and more, I began to notice some handling irregularities and wear beginning on a front tire. The parking brake which I had adjusted before we left stopped working and I began to make a mental note of all of these issues.


Upon our return, we scheduled a more comprehensive assessment of all of my mechanical concerns under the knowledgeable eyes of Ralph and Art at Cloverleaf Automotive. Then the bad news came: the front and rear suspension required complete rebuilds as they appeared to have never been touched during the extensive service history of the car. This is a common but costly repair that is shared by many XKEs of this vintage. The estimates to bring our XKE back to safe and correct condition would be in the neighborhood of 2/3 what we paid for the car just a year before. We thought long and hard about this new project realizing that with several vintage Jaguars already in a range of restoration and repairs, we did not want to start another. Plus, although we loved the look of the car and iconic shape, we decided that we would probably never use it again on a long-distance drive even if it was restored back to a high level of comfort, safety and performance.

Sadly, the decision was made to sell this XKE for about what we had invested in it during our year of ownership. With disappointing results from our local and national advertising in print and on the internet and with the XKE market rapidly dropping, we eventually offered the car on consignment to a local dealer. He experienced similar results as did I and we finally agreed to sell the car at a loss of about 30%. But we did enjoy the car during our period of ownership by adding several thousand miles to it. It was a truly nice example and everyone commented on its unique styling and presentation. While we couldn't agree more, all our cars are meant for driving and the XKE just did not fit our needs for comfort and performance.

Although this was a disappointing experience, looking back I am remined of several important suggestions that I have advocated over the years and would like to remind anyone contemplating a collector car purchase:

- 1. Never trust the seller to accurately describe the car. Inspect it yourself in person if you are capable or have it inspected by a marque expert near the location of the car. I have had good and bad experiences with "expert" prepurchase inspections and would advise using this method only as a last resort. At least you'll receive confirmation that the car of interest is real and operates good enough for transport.
- Assume the worst case and that the car will need some serious and expensive work which is likely to be the reason the seller is trying to sell it. Look deep into the owner's reason for selling,
- 3. Make sure the car model meets your expectations for purpose, performance, comfort and safety.
- 4. Don't be lulled into making a hasty decision by the visual appeal of a cosmetically beautiful car that probably has issues lurking beneath.

5.3-liter V12 engine





5.3-liter V12 engine from a 1973 XKE with less than 45k miles in excellent cosmetic and mechanical condition. All of the usual repairs have already been completed with some by prior owners such as cooling system cleaning and head rebuilds. Under the present ownership that included about 10k miles of driving on various vintage car events throughout the US, numerous upgrades and maintenance items have been completed. Notably, the troublesome OE Zenith-Stromberg carburetors have been replaced with reproduction SU carburetors that are currently available from Moss Motors for \$4300. These offer much better adjustment of idle mixture and fuel metering at speed and load. At that time, all fuel hoses and clamps were replaced. Also of note, the distributer has been re-





curved to incorporate vacuum advance rather than vacuum retard. This was done to encourage more suitable shifting from the OE automatic and better throttle response under load. These and other modifications retain much of the originality of these remarkable V12 engines but with notable performance improvement making this particular 5.3-liter V12 exceptionally well suited for use with a manual transmission. This engine runs perfectly and without fault as is shown in video clips that are available upon request. It is 100% reliable and in excellent cosmetic and mechanical condition and ready for installation in a suitable chassis. Most XKE Series 3 specific accessories are also included such as the recently rebuilt OE carbs, alternator, starter, electronic ignition and A/C compressor converted for R134. Some smaller trim and installation-specific parts such as hoses, balance pipes, wiring, accessory drive belts, etc. are also available. This is an ideal replacement engine for any Series III XKE with a bad engine but will require some parts salvaged from the engine being replaced. Asking \$6500 delivered locally but will also consider parting out some accessories. Will also consider buying your Series III with a bad engine but in presentable, not damaged or rusty condition.



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
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DVJC Wants You!
